The ESA mission Hera is currently studying the binary asteroid system Didymos and its
small moon Dimorphos. Dimorphos was deliberately hit by NASA's DART spacecraft in
2022, which shifted it from its original orbit. Hera aims to closely measure the effects
of this impact, the resulting crater, as well as the mass and structure of the asteroid.
This will be the first time a method for targeted deflection of dangerous asteroids is
thoroughly tested.

The most important constellations of the season will be presented along with tips on how to navigate and orient yourself in the night sky.

Thanks to the special glass fiber-optic technology of the ZEISS projector, you can marvel at a clear and magnificent view of the stars that are no longer visible from our brightly illuminated cities.

We will show you how you can use the sky for orientation without technical devices. Not only in Stuttgart, but even at the North Pole.

As is well known, the inhabitants of the southern hemisphere experience the opposite seasons. But does the same apply to the starry sky? To answer this question, we will take a virtual trip to Australia using planetarium technology and explore the magnificent southern sky.

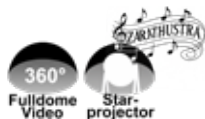
EXPLORE! INTO SPACE WITH KEPLER

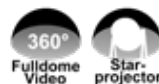
Is there alien life in the universe?

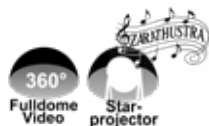
100 YEARS OF ETERNITY (100 JAHRE EWIGKEIT)

SUITABLE FOR AGES 12 AND UP

The invention of the first planetarium projector is celebrating its centenary. On behalf of the German Museum in Munich, the Carl Zeiss company in Jena developed the world's first sky projection. It was switched on for the first time on October 21, 1923. The first public presentations took place on May 7, 1925 in the German Museum.

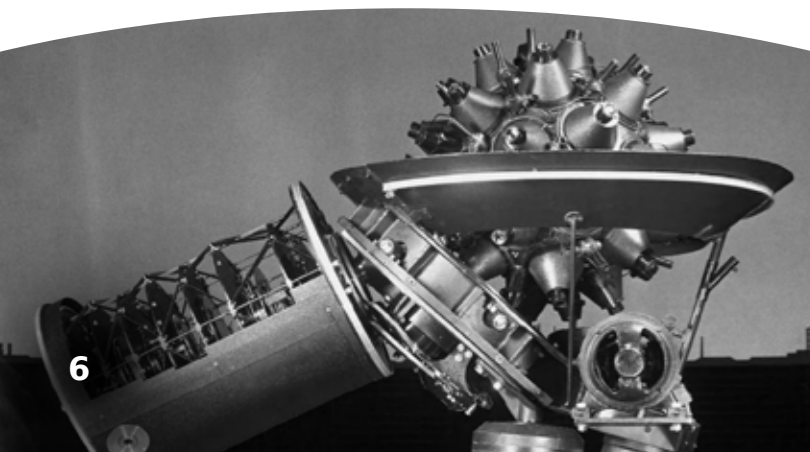
Today there are thousands of planetaria in the world and between 2023 and 2025 they celebrated the origin of the underlying invention that was considered awe-inspiring at the time and became known as the "Miracle of Jena".

After a closer look at the artificial starry sky we will explore the history of the planetarium and its creation. In the production "100 Years of Eternity" the audience embarks on a cultural and historical journey through high-resolution 360° images and dome-filling animations, retracing the events that took place in Jena a hundred years ago.

OUR PLANETARY NEIGHBORHOOD

PLANETS – JOURNEY INTO THE SOLAR SYSTEM (PLANETEN – EXPEDITION INS SONNENSYSTEM)

SUITABLE FOR AGES 8 AND UP

In this presentation we will use the magic of the planetarium to explore the planets of our solar system.

Our first stop is Mars, where we will search for signs of life. We will then visit the explosive landscape of a shattering comet and then take a closer look at the kingdoms of the giant planets Jupiter and Saturn. Cloud formations, volcanic moons and ring systems will unfold before our eyes.

After a detour to the distant dwarf planet Pluto we will reach beyond our solar system and take a speculative look at the surface of an exoplanet in the depths of space.

AURORA – LIGHTS OF WONDER (*AUORAS – LICHTER DES NORDENS*)

Our journey into the world of the Northern Lights begins in Stuttgart. We will get to know the stars and constellations of a winter evening sky before taking a virtual trip to the North Pole and experience the differences between the two vistas.

A trip to the International Space Station will show us how astronauts experience the auroras from above on the night side of our Earth. We will also learn about the interplay between solar wind, earth's magnetic field and atmosphere.

Finally we will travel to northern Canada, where photographer O Chul Kwon recorded the magical phenomenon of the northern lights (Aurora borealis) using his cutting-edge video technology.

A spectacular dance of shapes and colors awaits us in the night sky.

Saturn, with its spectacular rings of ice and rock, is also on their flight plan.

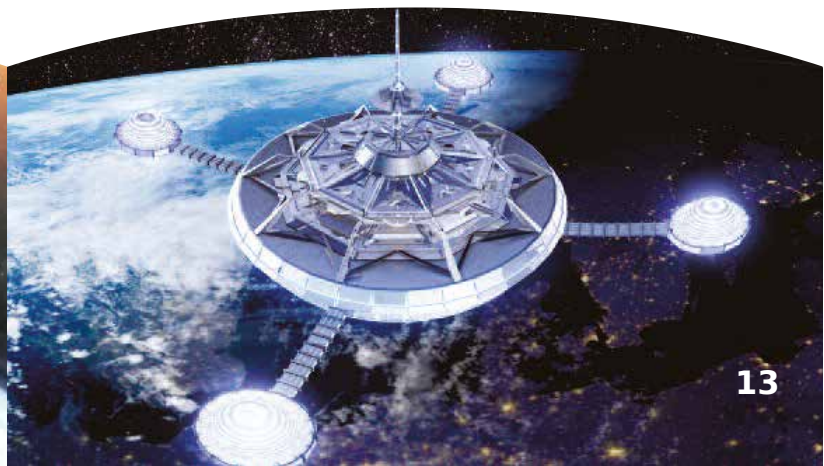
Later, like Icarus, they fly too close to the sun and are nearly devoured by hot tongues of flame.

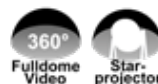
POLARIS AND THE SECRET OF THE NIGHT (POLARIS UND DAS GEHEIMNIS DER NACHT)

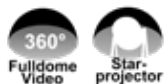

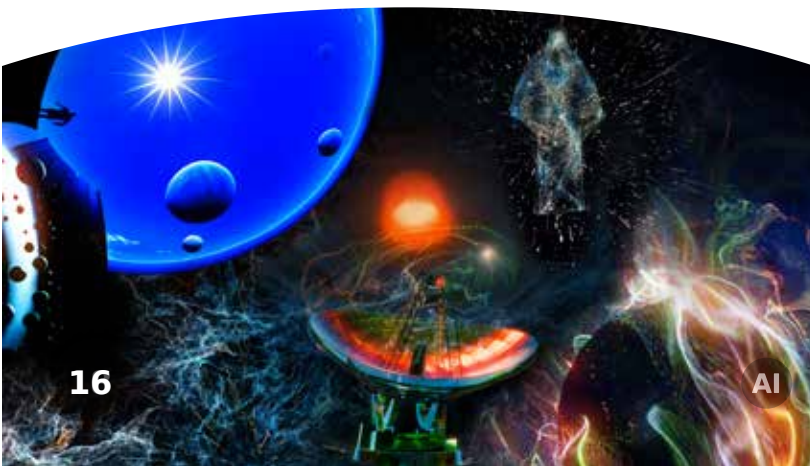

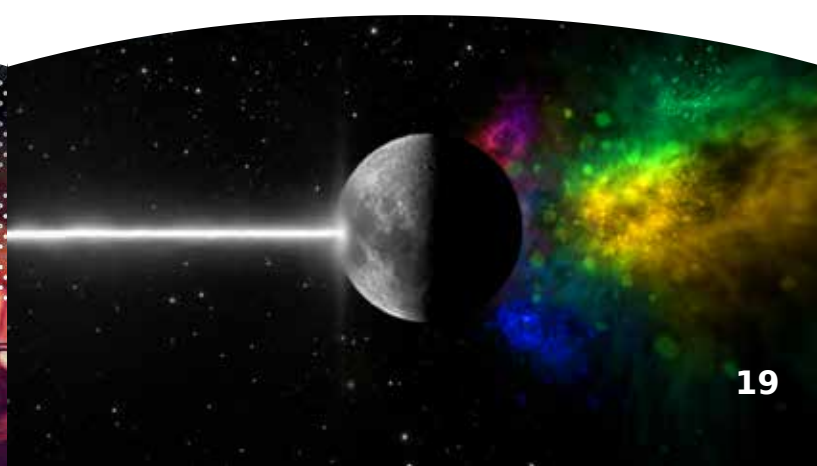
